SOUTH DAKOTA WHEAT COMMISSION Minutes of Meeting - January 11, 1962

SDWC met Jan. 11, 1962 in the offices of said commission, 321 S. Pierre St., Pierre, S.D. at 10:30 a.m. with Paul Guiser presiding and the following members present: Ernest Covey, Andrew Brakke, Melvin Borkirchert, Bert Mason.

Moved by Covey, seconded by Borkirchert that minutes of Dec. 19, 1961 meeting be approved. Motion carried.

Discussion on the proposal of Garal Productions on the bi-monthly news letter presented Dec. 19th resulted in the possibility of having one in conjunction with S.D. Wheat Producers, Inc. who would put one out on alternating months. All members in agreement that it would be very desirable if we had a newsletter of some sort to hand out at Crop Shows.

The January issue of The Plainsman, a publication of GPWI had a very good article on the SDWC. Five thousand copies of this is sue were ordered for distribution in our promotional program.

Moved by Brakke, seconded by Borkirchert that we purchase the Nebraska Wheat Commission exhibit at a cost of \$750. The exhibit is stored at the Merchants Transfer & Storage Company in Scottsbluff, Neb. They would ship it wherever we desired and also pay the cost of shipment. Motion carried.

Brakke was appointed to contact Theodore Fiedler, Dir. of GPWI European office, to obtain samples of Russian, Australian and Argentine wheat for use in the display which we are purchasing from the Neb. Wheat Commission.

Mason was appointed to secure information on the subsidy paid on export wheat going into foreign trade.

The next meeting of GPWI will be at Garden City on February 20,21,22. A sincere effort by all members to attend was urged by the Chairman.

During June a trade team from South Africa will be in South Dakota, Mason and Borkirchert were designated to make arrangements for this trade team to visit the northeast part of the state. Further information as to time and number of persons will be made_available.

The Hard Red Winter Wheat Conference to be held at Lincoln, Nebraska Jan. 16, 17 and 18 was discussed. Guiser, Covey and Tutsch were delegated to attend this meeting if possible.

In discussing the showing of our wheat display, motion was made by Brakke, seconded by Borkirchert that we try to attend the Feb. 6-7 Central S.D. Winter show at Huron, Bennett County at Martin on Feb. 12-13, and Northeast Crop Show at Watertown Feb. 14-17. The display which is stored at Presho will be shown at the Feb. 15-16 South Central S.D. Crop Show at Presho. Booth space rental is to be paid where necessary. Motion carried.

The possibility of placing \$5,000 to \$10,000 in either a savings account or time certificate deposit was discussed. Mason and Tutsch were to investigate and report findings at next meeting. The State Comptroller would also be consulted on this.

The mailing list for The Plainsman needed revising to include up to about 5000 and the President's Letter, which could be increased from the present 20 to 50 or 70, was discussed. Commission members were asked by Chairman Guiser to make up list of people in their areas who would appreciate and make use of these publications.

SOUTH DAKOTA WHEAT COMMISSION Minutes of Meeting held on March 2nd, 1962

The SDWC met March 2, 1962 at the offices of said commission located at 321 S. Pierre Street, Pierre, South Dakota with the following members present: Guiser, Brakke, Borkirchert, Mason. Absent: Covey.

Motion by Borkirchert, seconded by Mason that minutes of last meeting be approved as read. Motion carried.

Motion by Brakke, seconded by Borkirchert that we contact Tri-State Milling Co. at Rapid City for placement of foreign trainee for phase 1 and 2. If they are not willing to accept this trainee, then we will make effort to contact Peavey. Motion carried.

Leonard Nelson, County Agent from Edmunds County, appeared and was interviewed by Commission for possible position in Great Plains Wheat, Inc., Washington, D. C. office for Program Specialist. Mr. Nelson would be available April 1, if necessary.

It was noted that South Dakota may be by-passed by the South African trade team in June because the wheat would not be ready for harvest at that time. However, an effort will be made to get two trade teams in South Dakota.

Claim presented by Garal Productions for \$56.80 was discussed at length. It was felt that the trip to Huron was not authorized and this item (\$16.80) should not be allowed. Gary Enright had spent some time arranging material for the annual report to the Governor and therefore was entitled to some compensation (two afternoons' work on Annual Report to Governor - \$40.00, as indicated by claim submitted.) Motion made by Mason, seconded by Brakke that \$40.00 be paid for services rendered by Garal Productions; that proposals submitted by Garal Productions on December 19, 1961 be rejected for the present as no particular advantage could be gained by engaging their services in the proposed amounts, said amounts which seemed quite high due to lack of experience for a newly formed public relations firm; that Garal Productions be notified of such action taken on said proposals by Commission. Motion carried.

The News Letter was discussed at length. Tutsch reported that the State ASCS office had been consulted and that Mr. Al Johnson had given permission for the county ASCS offices to furnish the names and addresses of wheat growers. In some instances, the commission may be required to compensate for the work being done. A letter had been sent to each ASCS office and to date we had received the list of wheat growers from 12 counties without charge. Grant county had asked for \$15.00 for this service. This request was tabled temporarily.

Motion by Borkirchert, seconded by Mason that the director be instructed to make payment for this service if necessary but that in the larger counties with addressographs, the work would not exceed 2 hours and compensation would be made not to exceed \$2.00 an hour. Motion carried.

Borkirchert was appointed to get cost quotations on printing, mailing and addressing approximately 30,000 newsletters and report at the Rapid City meeting.

Motion be Brakke, seconded by Mason that we show the wheat display at the March 21-22 Weed & Pest Control meeting in Huron, at the Woman's Building. Mason would attend the meeting and man the display. Motion carried.

Motion by Brakke, seconded by Borkirchert that salary of director be raised to \$6,250.00 per annum, effective March 1, 1962. Motion carried.

James Vaske, majoring in Agricultural Business Economics at State College, was interviewed for the position of Program Specialist in the Washington, D.C. GPWI office. Action on Mr. Vaske's application was delayed until further information was received from him.

The feasibility of covering the SDWC with insurance similar to Workmen's Compensation was discussed at length. Mr. Norman Bonin was called into discuss the group hospital coverage the State employees are entitled to. This being an individual plan for all state employees who wanted to participate, the matter was left up to each individual.

A film entitled "Agricultural Showcase Abroad" was shown. Motion by Borkirchert, seconded by Brakke that we do not purchase this film as it was too general in nature. Motion carried.

Ralph Cline advised that if at all possible, Mr. Bentley would like to have 30 days advance notice of meetings. This would enable him to arrange for someone to attend meetings in the interests of the wheat industry.

The possibility of placing films which the Wheat Commission will purchase in the film library at State College was discussed. More information, to be compiled by the director, was needed before a decision could be made.

Ralph Cline stated that a plant breeder (a Dr. Wells) was being installed at State College which should help work in developing new wheat varieties.

Motion by Borkirchert, seconded by Mason that meeting adjourn. Motion carried.

Motion by Borkirchert, seconded by Brakke that director negotiate with banks and place \$10,000.00 in Time Certificate Deposits in this manner: (5) \$1,000.00 and (2) \$2,500.00. Motion carried.

Motion by Borkirchert, seconded by Mason that meeting adjourn at 11:30 a.m.

The SDWC met briefly at 4:00 p.m. in the offices of said commission located at 321 South Pierre Street, Pierre, South Dakota with the following members present: Guiser, Covey, Brakke, Borkirchert. Absent: Bert Mason.

The west coast export rate reduction hearing to be held March 29-30 in Seattle, Washington was discussed. C. A. Carr, rate analyst for South Dakota Public Utilities Commission informed the commission that he planned to attend on behalf of the Public Utilities Commission. Motion by Brakke, seconded by Borkirchert that Guiser and Mason attend this hearing because the wheat producers in South Dakota would benefit from the reduction if granted. The present rate of about \$1.42 per hundred pounds to the proposed rate of 70¢ would provide a new outlet for South Dakota Wheat. Motion carried.

The conference on The Role of Wheat in the World's Food Supply to be held April 30 and May 1 and 2 at the U.S.D.A. Western Utilization Research Laboratory in Albany, California was discussed. Borkirchert indicated that if time permitted he would be able to attend this conference.

Guiser gave an oral report of transportation meeting in Seattle on March 29th, 1962.

Charles Nauman, Nauman Productions, showed a film entitled "Fare Thee West" prepared by his firm for the S. D. Dept. of Highways. A proposal was presented for making a film for the Wheat Commission. This proposal was filed with director Tutsch. Due to limited time, action on proposal was delayed until such time as the commission could look it over.

Question was asked about changing Nebraska EV shorts to South Dakota trailers or leaders; estimated cost would be about \$30.00.

Guiser reported on Brazil sugar for wheat trade—5 year agreement of

250,000,000 bushels) per year. Other states suggested caution should
be taken and more investigation made before accepting agreement. It was moved by

Mason, seconded by Brakke, to check and have thorough look into Brazil trade of
wheat for sugar before action by Commission. Motion carried.

Chief Clerk, Connie McKelvy, and part-time clerk, Joyce Tutsch, are leaving about June 1st. It was agreed to try and hire someone about the middle of May to become oriented before the two leave.

Guiser, Mason and Tutsch were designated to meet with officials of the Milwaukee Road in Sioux Falls on April 27th on rates of wheat for export to the West Coast. C.A.Carr, Public Utilities Commission rate analyst, would ride with Tutsch to Sioux Falls for this meeting.

Motion was made by Mason, seconded by Brakke, not to purchase any additional material or novelties for American Home Economics meeting in Florida on June 26-29. Motion carried.

Motion by Brakke, seconded by Covey, that one carton of S.D.Wheat Commission notepads be sent for distribution at the Florida meeting. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Mason, seconded by Brakke, that we contribute to proposed fund (travel) of GPWI for travel expenses of South Dakota directors to board meetings of GPWI if such contributions are in agreement with the State Comptroller's office. Kansas had shown discontent over the present way of paying travel expenses and a new method was being investigated. Motion carried. Brakke was appointed to check with State Comptroller on this matter.

Motion by Covey, seconded by Brakke, that second issue (March-April) of newsletter be compiled and sent out on present rate (application to mail at second-class postage rate pending). Further motion made that we would hold off making up another newsletter until postage rate has been determined by postal authorities and that we look into possibilities of getting it done on contract. Motion carried.

Guiser suggested that travel and per diem vouchers be prepared at each meeting and that telephone slips of users be sent into office of commission each month.

The SDWC met at 7:30 p.m. May 22nd, 1962 in Room 709, Sheraton-Johnson Hotel, Rapid City, South Dakota with the following present: Guiser, Covey, Mason, Borkirchert, Brakke.

Motion was made by Mason, seconded by Brakke that we consider and purchase space in County Fair premium or prize lists, if requested by various fair boards.

Guiser reported that Cliff Hope, Gil Young and he would appear before the Agricultural Committee of the Rapid City Chamber of Commerce at 3:00 p.m. on May 24th, 1962 to give them a resume of what the wheat organizations were attempting to do.

No action was taken on a letter received from the Crop Quality Council requesting support in Congress for an additional appropriation for statistical information.

It was agreed that the South Dakota Wheat Commission would support the sugar-for-wheat trade with Brazil which was being negotiated.

Guiser reported that a letter had been received from Orville G. Bentley, Dean of Agriculture, S.D. State College, giving the estimated cost of constructing and maintaining a green house to speed wheat breeding work. The approximate cost was \$9,000. Action was delayed until the June 12th meeting.

A letter of application for employment was received from Harvey Aman, Roscoe, S.D. He will be interviewed at 2:30 p.m. on June 12th when the Commission next meets.

Motion was made by Covey, seconded by Borkirchert, that the minutes of April 24th meeting be approved as corrected. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Brakke, seconded by Borkirchert, that meeting recess until May 25th. Motion carried and meeting was recessed at 11:35 p.m.

The SDWC reconvened in Room 520, Sheraton-Johnson Hotel with Guiser, Covey, Borkirchert, Mason and Brakke present at 6:00 p.m. May 25th, 1962.

Various proposals of the Great Plains Wheat board of directors were discussed.

In order to allow better coordination for the deduction and collection of the wheat promotional fee, it was moved by Borkirchert, seconded by Mason, that the following agreement be adopted:

"North Dakota-South Dakota Wheat Commission Agreement -- The enactment of the laws creating the North and South Dakota Wheat Commissions has resulted in certain problems for which there is no specific provision made in the original law. In order to simplify the administration of the first purchaser (elevator manager) in deducting the wheat promotional fee, the two wheat commissions have mutually agreed to adopt the following policy:-

- "1. First purchasers in North Dakota will deduct said fee of 2 mills per bushel from all producers and sellers of wheat, irrespective of whether grown in North Dakota or South Dakota, and remit to the North Dakota Wheat Commission
- "2. First purchasers in South Dakota will deduct said fee of 3 mills per bushel from all producers and sellers of wheat, irrespective of whether grown in North Dakota or South Dakota and remit to the South Dakota Wheat Commission.

Minutes of meeting of June 12, 1962

The South Dakota Wheat Commission met June 12, 10:30 a.m. at the offices of said commission located at 321 South Pierre Street with the following present: Guiser, Covey, Borkirchert, Mason, and Brakke.

Doctors Larry Fine and Darrel Wells, South Dakota State College, met with the commission and discussed the need for additional greenhouse space for wheat improvement. Dr. Wells pointed out that plant breeding was a profession requiring tools and personnel. He said that wheat breeding can make use of greehnouse space in the following ways:

- 1. To produce more generations a year than the one that can be grown in the field.
- 2. To make crosses among plants so that we would have several opportunities a year to make crosses rather than one only.
- 3. To make disease tests and winter hardiness tests under controlled conditions.

The cost estimate for Gro-Mor plastic and aluminum greenhouse, a total of 1280 square feet of space for winter wheat, hard red spring, and durum wheat is as follows:

3,000 sq.ft. - includes office, laboratory, storage @ \$15 per sq.ft. \$20,000 for basic equipment \$30,000 for additional scientific and testing equipment \$25,000 for scientist to man this lab per year

Motion by Brakke, seconded by Covey that the SDWC pay travel expense to Wheat Literature Abstract Service Workshop, July 10, 1962, at Lincoln, Nebraska, for a qualified person from State College to report on whether or not such a service to South Dakota is necessary, desirable, and economically feasible. Minutes of Meeting of December 6, 1962

The South Dakota Wheat Commission met December 6, 1962, in the offices of the Commission located at 321 South Pierre Street, Pierre, South Dakota, with the following present: Guiser, Covey, Borkirchert, Mason, and Brakke.

Minutes of the meeting of October II, 1962 were read. Motion to approve the minutes as read was made by Brakke, seconded by Covey. Motion carried.

The financial statements for October and November were read by Treasurer Mason. Motion was made by Borkirchert, seconded by Covey that the treasurer's report be accepted. Motion carried.

Chairman Guiser reported that when he was in Washington, D. C., that he and Jim Vaske of the Great Plains Wheat Washington, D. C., office had an appointment with Mr. Redmond and Mr. Monroney, personnel of the Federal Postal Department, relative to the SDWC securing a minimum postal permit or a 50% discount bulk third class matter permit for the mailing of the Commission newsletter and other matter. It was determined that the Commission was not eligible for the minimum $1/8 \it c$ rate but it was thought that the Commission was entitled to being approved for the 50% bulk third class permit and that all provisions and conditions of the Commission law be explained in detail on the postal permit application. They suggested and explained that in order for the Commission to secure the privileges of the $1/8\phi$ mailing rate that an amendment to the present law may be secured as such was the case this past session of Congress to include another association similar to the Wheat Commission. On January 9, 1962, the Commission applied for this permit and was denied on January 22, 1962. Denial was based on that part of the Postal Manual which excludes a State governmental body from mailing bulk third-class matter under permit at 50% postage discount even though such State body is operated on a nonprofit basis.

Mr. Ronald L. Struwe appeared before the Commission to explain in detail a communications proposal for the South Dakota Wheat Commission. The outline of the problem was discussed at length, and it was generally agreed by the Commission that we should attempt to get our story across to the thousands of producers who are supporting our efforts and convince them that the avenue upon which the Commission has embarked is the one which will yield the best results to them. Stress should also be placed with the press and other mass media to get the story of the wheat industry across to the total population of South Dakota. Several parts of the communications proposal were discussed with ideas brought out by both Mr. Struwe and Commission members. It was generally agreed by the Commission that Mr. Struwe be engaged on a trial basis to carry out this communications proposal. It was felt that a ceiling would or should be placed on charges for services rendered by Mr. Struwe. Mr. Struwe estimated that his charges should not exceed \$250 per month, and he felt that as time would progress much of the work would take less time. The type of proposal which Mr. Struwe had proposed would allow a 30-day cancellation notice by either party.

Mr. Roy Potas, agricultural statistician in charge of the South Dakota Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, met briefly with the Commission. He inquired as to the use and need for the South Dakota agricultural reports which were made up and distributed by his office. Mr. Potas said that if the reports were not serving a purpose and were not needed they will be dropped because the financial picture will not allow the continuation of this service. This was a service which would have to be supported by an appropriation from the Appropriations Committee of the South Dakota Legislature and the \$16,000 which was being suggested would not be adequate to carry on this service.

It was noted that eight elevators were not reporting to the Wheat Commission nor answering any correspondence sent to them from the Wheat Commission office. Motion was made by Brakke, seconded by Mason that the director make an attempt to personally contact the delinquent elevators. Motion carried.

It was moved by Covey, seconded by Brakke that we exhibit the Wheat

Display at the 1963 Sioux Empire Farm Show in Sioux Falls, South Dakota. An effort is to be made to obtain space in the Educational Building; but if necessary, that the director purchase space in the Commercial Section provided that the expense is reasonable. Motion carried.

Mr. Andrew Brakke reported on the Farmers Elevator Association of South Dakota meeting at Huron December 3 and 4 attended by Brakke, Borkirchert, and Tutsch. Brakke reported that the plans had not developed as well as expected but that many fine contacts had been made with managers and others interested in the selling of wheat. Mr. Howard Hardy of the Great Plains/central office arrived on the morning of December 4, and in the afternoon a visit was made to the ASCS office to visit with Ralph J. Hohenthaner and George Van Sherrel. The purpose of this meeting was to try to iron out the question as to the information desired in making a survey of the quality of wheat under loan. We found the office very willing to cooperate in any way possible to help obtain the wheat quality survey, but they needed clarification from the Wheat Commission as to the number of samples desired from each county. They indicated that around January first they would be making additional loans and that at this time they could pick up samples from various bins of farm-stored wheat to make up a composite sample to be sent in to the state office. These samples would be kept separate by year from 1959 through 1962. Within a few days the State ASCS office would be expecting a letter from the South Dakota Wheat Commission outlining the size of the areas in each county that we had in mind in regard to drawing samples, the number of samples from each county, and any other details necessary in order that they may implement the survey immediately. This letter was to come from the Commission after their December 6 meeting.

Mr. Clifford Hope of the Great Plains Wheat central office asked that the members states of GPW send in a list to the central office of individuals they would have available for special assignment listing them in preferential order and giving the dates they could serve between February and May. He said the next trip scheduled would probably be in the Pacific area in early January and that two representatives were tentatively scheduled for South America, two for Europe, two for Africa, and possibly one to serve on a combination survey team to Australia in cooperation with Western Wheat Associates. The matter will come before the Coordinating Committee scheduled December II in Denver.

Mr. Richard Hawkins, a salesman for IBM equipment, met briefly with the Commission and gave a short demonstration of IBM dictation equipment. It was agreed that the Commission office would use the equipment for a week or ten days and report to the Commission on their satisfaction or dissatisfaction with the equipment.

Tutsch gave a brief report on the Nebraska elevators visited November 21. There were two in Valentine, one in Crookston, one in Kilgore, and one in Cody, Nebraska. All elevators with the exception of Cody were very cooperative and said they did not mind doing this work for the South Dakota wheat producer. The Cody elevator agreed to send in one check with one report at the end of each year. Under the circumstances this was agreed upon.

The Commission indicated that they did not have too much knowledge of the bookkeeping done in the Commission office. Mrs. Dorothy Maden was called in and gave a very comprehensive and clear report of the bookkeeping procedures which had been outlined by the State Comptroller's office.

Mr. Howard Hardy, vice president of Great Plains Wheat, Inc., was present and made several comments. He felt that the Commission should meet for two days to conduct the necessary business of the Commission; that a policy statement similar to GPW or the other commission states should be adopted to guide the director, the chairman, and the Commission; and that closer liaison be maintained between the Commission and the grower association. The commissions and the growers must then work in closer cooperation with the already established agricultural organizations, commodity groups, educational institutions and educational staff people, and the grain trade.
